Historical Note: Emil Seidel was born Dec. 13, 1864 to Otto Seidel and Henrietta Knoll. His family moved to Milwaukee in 1869 and Emil worked as a woodcarver. By 1893 he was spending more time involved in the Socialist movement than in his profession. Seidel was elected to the Common Council in 1904 and reelected in 1906. He easily won the Mayor's office in 1910 becoming the first Socialist mayor of a major American city.
