Abstract: Peter Van Vechten born in 1827 in Catskill Creek, New York. He and his brother Samuel moved to Milwaukee in 1845, where Peter worked as a bookkeeper in Samuel's store. Samuel returned east in 1846, and Peter secured a succession of jobs as postal agent, collector of customs and with the sheriff's department. He also was an early member of Milwaukee's volunteer fire department. He passed away in December 1913.

Scope and Content: The collection contains personal reminiscences, biographical information, correspondence, and other ephemera related to various members of the Van Vechten family but primarily Peter Van Vechten.
