

Title: Menomonee River Valley Collection

Abstract: Prior to white settlement, the Menomonee River Valley was an area of extensive marsh swamp, which provided wild rice and other game for the Native Americans living nearby. White settlers saw the economic potential of the valley and landfilling work began as early as 1849. Initially, the valley facilitated Milwaukee's rise as a commercial power, but it eventually became the heart of the city's industrial development. In the latter 20th century, however, freeway development, economic recession and deindustrialization ushered in a period of decline in the valley. Efforts were made in the early 2000's to revitalize the area through light industrial development and recreational use.

Scope and Content: The collection consists of newspaper clippings, articles and various reports on the valley's history, development and revitalization.
