Abstract: Born in Carlsbad (or Karlsbad), Austria, Josef Kallaus came to Milwaukee in 1901 with his wife Mary (nee Lemley), son J. Kurt and (possibly) daughter Ada (birth date unknown). Mr. Kallaus was skilled in the art of china painting and his clientele included the Val Blatz and Plankinton families. His shop was located on the corner of Broadway and Wells above which the family dwelt. At the time of his death in 1936 he resided at 1427 N. Humbolt.

J. Kurt Kallaus, often referred to only by his middle name, was interested in radio in his early years and graduated from East Division High School in 1915. Later he opened a camera repair shop and married Ruby York. Kurt's sister Ada married Arnold A. Naulin, president of the Milwaukee Advertising Club and later married P. Paterson and lived in Buffalo, NY.

Scope and Content: The collection consists of correspondence, newspaper clippings and other family ephemera.
