

**Title:** Kanzelberger, Margaret Papers

**Abstract:** Margaret Kanzelberger (nee Kopf or Kopff) was born in Hanover, Germany, ca. 1901. She married Kaufman Hans Horst and divorced him in July 1921. She then married William E. Bock on May 10, 1925, in Hanover and divorced him on September 24, 1928. By this time, she had immigrated to the U.S. She married George Kanzelberger in 1932. She was convicted in 1964 of second-degree murder in the death of her husband and sentenced to 5 to 7 years at Taycheedah State Prison.

**Scope and Content:** The collection includes correspondence, some from German soldiers during World War I, legal documents pertaining to Margaret's divorces and murder trial, and newspaper clippings, including Nazi newspapers with photos of party activities and Hitler Youth.
