Prohibition is considered one of the Largest legislative interventions in the history of the United States. At the same time the 1920s were more than just flappers, speakeasies, and bootleggers. What were the roots of the movement and how did people resist it? This talk explores the people, places, and organizations instrumental in the Prohibition movement and 1920s Milwaukee.

☐ Transportation in Milwaukee Part 1: "Steel Wheels and Shipping" Part 2: "Rubber Wheels and Aviation"

This two-part presentation dives into the history of transportation in Milwaukee. The presentation are divided into two 1-hour presentations. <u>Part One</u> focuses on the history of transportation in Milwaukee with a focus on steel-wheeled forms of transportation (trains, streetcars, and interurbans), plus ships and boats. <u>Part Two</u> focuses on history of transportation in Milwaukee with a focus on rubber-wheeled forms of transportation (buses, automobiles, and bicycles), the history of streets and roads, and aviation.

Why Should He Not Be Welcomed? The Transnational Network Between Ireland & MKE

Did you know the Irish in Milwaukee shipped flour back to Ireland to help feed the Irish in the Great Hunger? This talk explores how the Irish in the city engaged in activism for Ireland's future, and how organizations in the city today preserve Irish-American culture. Discover how Milwaukee impacted Ireland throughout the decades.

The following is a list of popular presentation topics based on the areas of expertise of the staff and topics that are often requested.

🔜 Milwaukee: City of Three Rivers

The story of the Milwaukee, Menomonee, and Kinnickinnic Rivers and their relationship with the city, both past and present, told thematically with sections covering hydrography, transportation, recreation, industry and commerce, and decline and restoration.

💻 Milwaukee: City of Festivals

While most people think of the festivals held at H. Maier Festival Park, the origins of the city's passion for festivals goes back to the mid 19th century—from the earliest Sangerfests and Turnfest to the major festivals of today.

African American History in MKE Part 1, 1835-1960 and Part 2, 1960-2000

The presence of African Americans, in the city of Milwaukee is long and notable. Since the 19th century, Blacks have played a critical role in shaping the city, influencing political, social, and economic policies; challenging the city to maintain and extend its commitment to democracy.

💻 The War to End All Wars

This lecture will examine the Milwaukee home front during World War I and will discuss the good, the bad, and the ugly sides of how city residents responded to the military, social, and economic demands of the conflict.

💻 Latine History in Milwaukee

Latine communities have been present in Milwaukee since the late 1800s. People from Central and South America established a strong presence in Milwaukee's history and present day. This presentation explores the impact of the Latines in Milwaukee.

Milwaukee's Holiday Traditions

Remember the Holiday Parade, decorated windows Downtown, holiday lights and other local traditions? Let's reminisce.

☐ Take Me Out to the Ball Game: Professional Baseball in Milwaukee

The history of baseball in Milwaukee, tracing the origins of the game in the city and highlighting the teams, ballparks, and people most important to the story of Milwaukee baseball.

💻 Milwaukee's Founders

The story of the three founders of Milwaukee (Solomon Juneau, Byron Kilbourn, and George Walker) and their impact on the city's early history.

The Wisconsin State Fair Through the Decades

A decade-by-decade look at the history of the Wisconsin State Fair, discussing the evolution of attractions, events, food, and more from the inaugural fair in Janesville in 1851 to the contemporary state fair. This presentation also covers the development and year-round use of Wisconsin State Fair Park in West Allis.

From Vaults to Views: Exploring the Architecture of the MCHS

This talk or tour* will focus on the

architecture and restoration of the impressive "Brewers Bank". Built in 1913 as the Second Ward Savings Bank, the building today serves as the MCHS headquarters.
